Course Description

This course is an introduction to the major research approaches used in the field of communication and media studies.

Objectives of the Course

- To examine major methodological traditions and research tools within communication and media studies.
- To examine connections between theories and research methods.
- To experience the data gathering and analysis process.
- To develop skill in writing effective research proposals.
- To understand the social context of the research process, including the practical, political, and ethical dimensions of research.

Assignments Overview:

Please note that for each assignment, you are expected to present your work in class and give others feedback. Your attendance on those days is required and counts for half the grade of the assignment.

Oct. 2 Online Ethics Tutorial (5%)

Fill out the online ethics tutorial: http://tcps2core.ca/welcome Create an account and complete the modules. It could take you up to 2 hours to complete. You can work in pairs, but you must each submit your named certificate to me via email. Following the Ethics workshop on September 25, you will also fill out consent forms to be handed in with your final project.

Oct. 16 Writing Assignment (20%)

Find a passage - from a paragraph to a few pages - of an author's work that you really enjoy reading and that is related to your thesis or dissertation topic.

- 1) Note the elements that you like and write a few lines about what makes the passage "work"
- 2) How is the argument made or story told?
- 3) Write 1000 words related to your project, attempting to imitate this style. Do not use something you've already drafted start completely fresh.
- 4) Reflect in class on how you were able to mimic the style. Consider the limitations as well. Come to class with your 1000-word text and notes about the process.
- 5) Review another student's work and provide feedback.

Oct. 30 Interview Assignment (20%)

You will interview one of your classmates about their thesis or dissertation. You will transcribe 10 minutes of the interview and reflect on the process. You will also be interviewed by one of your classmates.

Nov. 6 Public Talk (10%)

Attend and engage or write a short reflection paper.

Dec. 4 Final Project: (45%)

You will write a 3000-4500 outline of your research plan, including ethics and a breakdown of your approach.

Plagiarism

Using any source whatsoever without clearly documenting it is a serious academic offense. Consequences include failure on the assignment, failure in the course and possibly suspension or expulsion from the university.

You must document not only direct quotations but also paraphrases and ideas where they appear in your text. A reference list at the end is insufficient by itself. In-text citations must be provided, and readers must be able to tell exactly where your words and ideas end and other people's words and ideas begin. Wording taken directly from a source must be enclosed within quotation marks (or, for long quotations, presented in the format prescribed by the documentation style you are using). Paraphrased information must not follow the original wording and sentence structure with only slight word substitutions here and there. These requirements apply to all assignments and sources, including those in non-traditional formats such as Web pages or visual media.
