Course Description

In this course, students will respond critically to academic and literary readings, conduct inquiry-based research on assigned topics, and work on argumentative essay content and format. Ample class time will be given to practice writing skills and the more advanced sentence/paragraph building techniques featured in the two assigned textbooks.

Objectives of the Course:

- to read and write critically
- to write effective sentences and paragraphs using essential good grammar
- to conduct valid research and use proper citation methods (APA and MLA formats)
- to create strong thesis statements, research questions, and outlines
- to construct and revise clear, cohesive, and well-defended essays

1. 7 Short In-class Assignments (20%), closed and/or open book, T.B.A.

Each short in-class assignment will include two segments: Part A, to be completed and submitted at the beginning of class, and Part B, to be finished and submitted at the end of class. Both parts A and B must be submitted during class for the assignment to be considered complete. Students who turn in all seven assignments will have their two lowest assignment grades replaced by their two highest assignment grades (thus, counted twice); those submitting only five or six assignments will receive zero on their missing assignment(s). In total, at least five out of the seven in-class assignments must be completed for a passing grade in this course.

2. Research Assignment, Feb 5^{th (}10%)

Students will collect source material and write an outline for a short essay on an assigned topic. (Some class time will be allotted for this.)

3. Writing Skills Test, Feb. 12th (20%): 2 hours, open book

Students will be asked to respond to academic readings and exercises using sentence/paragraph building techniques and specific essay elements studied in class.

4. Argumentative Essay, March 19th (20%)

A 1200 word essay will be assigned on a specific topic; details will be announced in class and posted on Blackboard. (Some class time will be allotted for this.)

5. Final Exam - location and date to be scheduled by the Registrar: (25%) 3 hours, open book

Students will be asked to respond to academic or literary readings and exercises in sentence, paragraph, and/or longer formats.

6. Professionalism Grade, T.B.A. (5%)

Responding to short questions, students will evaluate and self-grade their own participation, effort, attitude, attendance, and working relationships with others in the class. This grade is meant to encourage the high level of self-motivation expected at university and beyond.

It is the student's responsibility to keep a copy of each (returned) assignment and (returned) exams. Note: Please hand in your essays directly to your tutor or instructor if possible. If it is not possible to do so, a daytime drop box is available in SS320; a date stamp is provided for your use. A night drop box is also available for after-hours submission. Assignments will be removed the following morning, stamped with the previous day's date, and placed in the instructor's mailbox.

Plagiarism

Using any source whatsoever without clearly documenting it is a serious academic offense. Consequences include failure on the assignment, failure in the course and possibly suspension or expulsion from the university.

You must document not only direct quotations but also paraphrases and ideas where they appear in your text. A reference list at the end is insufficient by itself. Readers must be able to tell exactly where your words and ideas end and other people's words and ideas begin. This includes assignments submitted in non-traditional formats such as Web pages or visual media, and material taken from such sources.
