Course Description

This course is a critical introduction to interdisciplinary research methodologies. Students will explore, practice, and critique various quantitative and qualitative research methodologies (including surveys, content analysis, case studies, interviews and focus groups), and critique various perspectives on the processes of knowledge production. We will also examine ethical considerations in research, and how research is situated within the broader social context.

The course introduces students to the basic elements of designing and conducting social research. Topics covered in this course include: designing a research project, conducting a literature review, assessing the ethical aspects of social research, and qualitative and quantitative research methods. The course takes a hands-on approach, and students will conduct research of their own by participating in a small group research project throughout the length of the course.

Additional Information

This course takes a hands-on approach to learning, and regular attendance is expected.

Objectives of the Course

The primary objectives of this course are to help students develop skills in conducting research, and to become critical and informed consumers of research. By the end of the course, students will be able to:

- Evaluate social research methods;
- Design, conduct and carry out a social research project, including primary data collection and data analysis;
- Critically evaluate their own and others' research.

About the Tests:

- Test #1 (15%) on September 26, 2014 will contain multiple choice and/or short answer or short essay questions. It will cover the material in Chapters 1-5 of the required text, lecture material and all other material covered to that point in the course.
- **Test #2** (25%) on October 29, 2014 is noncumulative and will contain multiple choice and/or short answer or short essay questions. It will cover the material in Chapters 6-27 of the required text, lecture material and all other material covered to that point in the course (after Test #1).

About the Group Project:

Students will work in groups of four (4) to complete a group project over the length of the course. The project comprises 50% of the mark in the course, and has five components:

 Part 1: Research Proposal and Annotated Bibliography (5%, due September 24, 2014)

- Each group will prepare a 2-3 (double-spaced) page Research Proposal for their research project, and an Annotated Bibliography (5-6 academic sources).
- Part 2: Literature Review (10%, due September 26, 2014);
 - Each group will prepare a 4-7 (double-spaced) page Literature Review, properly referenced.
- Part 3: Research Design & Methodology (10%, due November 5, 2014));
 - Each group will prepare a 4-7 (double-spaced) page paper outlining the research design and methodology for their research project, and documentation related to the ethics approval process.
- Part 4: Research Report (20%, due December 3, 2014))
 - Each group will prepare an 8-12 (double spaced) page paper reporting on their research project, including data analysis, interpretation and conclusions.
- Part 5: Presentation (5%, December 3/5, 2014)
 - During the last week of classes each group will present their project to the class in a presentation of approximately 10 minutes

Further details of each component will be provided the first day of class.

About Participation (10%): ongoing

Participation (10%) through regular attendance and participation in class discussion and activities is an essential component of the course. Students are expected to attend classes and participate; "participation" is not only attendance per se but contributing to each other's learning and participating in the creation of a positive atmosphere and learning environment.

Where a grade on a particular assignment is expressed as a letter grade, it will normally be converted to a number using the midpoint of the scale. That is, A- would be converted to 87.5% for calculation purposes. F will be converted to zero.

Plagiarism

Using any source whatsoever without clearly documenting it is a serious academic offense. Consequences include failure on the assignment, failure in the course and possibly suspension or expulsion from the university.

You must document not only direct quotations but also paraphrases and ideas where they appear in your text. A reference list at the end is insufficient by itself. In-text citations must be provided, and readers must be able to tell exactly where your words and ideas end and other people's words and ideas begin. Wording taken directly from a source must be enclosed within quotation marks (or, for long quotations, presented in the format prescribed by the documentation style you are using). Paraphrased information must not follow the original wording and sentence structure with only slight word substitutions here and there. These requirements apply to all assignments and sources, including those in non-traditional formats such as Web pages or visual media.
