#### **Course Description**

This course is a critical exploration of how Modernity has been transformed within an evolving global culture. The focus is on major ideas, principles and their implications in the later 20th and 21st centuries. Students will explore our recent past and our complex present, and examine perspectives on basic issues that have always confronted humanity but are even more pressing as technology moves us into the future – what it means to be human; how technological progress shapes ethics, morality, justice, and the social order; what rights and responsibilities come with knowledge and power; how the collapse of truth and "grand narratives" affects religion and science, work, economics, and politics.

## **Objectives of the Course**

- familiarize students with the experience of learning how to read, critically evaluate, and creatively explore classic texts which articulate fundamental cultural assumptions
- learn how to develop and defend intellectual positions concerning those fundamental life questions to which classic texts address themselves
- strengthen abilities to discuss and present insights gained in the course

All assignments must be completed or a grade of F may be assigned at the discretion of the instructor.

**Reflective Journal:** The purpose of this assignment is to reflect on each reading in order to prepare for regular participation in class discussion and to study for the quizzes. The journal will be composed of one entry for each day's assigned readings; each entry must be no less than 250 words and no more than 500 words. Journals will be submitted at 4 points during the course. The instructor will normally look at one entry of his/her own choosing, but will also read any entry that the student wishes to have examined. The grade will be based on the quality of the entries marked and on the number of entries completed; marks will be deducted for missing or unsubstantial entries.

**Reading Quizzes**: The purpose of the quizzes is to test the student's mastery of the assigned readings. The quizzes will be short answer. The instructor will provide a number of passages drawn from the readings and class discussion, and students will be required to identify the author of each passage and answer a few content-related questions about each passage.

**Small Group Presentation**: Each group of 2-4 students will present (within 20 minutes max.) to the entire class on the day's assigned readings. The emphasis should be on making connections between the readings. Any kind of media or original mode of presentation will be allowed, and creativity is encouraged. All members of the group will get the same grade except for those who made no viable contribution, based on the observation of the instructor and other group members. A written summary and PowerPoint slideshow is expected. Groups will be created and presentation dates will be assigned by the instructor.

**Comparative Essay**: The essay of 2000-2500 words will require students to make connections between 4-5 readings from the textbook, and explore how those readings relate to a developing understanding of a particular fundamental cultural assumption. No secondary research will be required, but the textbook readings must be properly cited using MLA. Essays will be evaluated on content, structure & organization, grammar & expression, and citation.

## **Submission of Assignments**

All written assignments will be submitted and returned through Dropbox on D2L. No assignments will be submitted in hardcopy, whether handed to the instructor, dropped at the main office, or slid under office doors, nor will assignments be accepted through email

attachment. It is the student's responsibility to keep a copy of each submitted assignment, and to check email regularly for notices of missing assignments. The final Reading Quiz will be held by the department; to pick up this assignment in SS320 after the end of term, you will need to provide picture ID.

## **Plagiarism**

Using any source whatsoever without clearly documenting it is a serious academic offense. Consequences include failure on the assignment, failure in the course and possibly suspension or expulsion from the university.

You must document not only direct quotations but also paraphrases and ideas where they appear in your text. A reference list at the end is insufficient by itself. Readers must be able to tell exactly where your words and ideas end and other people's words and ideas begin. Wording taken directly from a source must be enclosed within quotation marks (or, for long quotations, presented in the format prescribed by the documentation style you are using). Paraphrased information must not follow the original wording and sentence structure with only slight word substitutions here and there. This includes assignments submitted in non-traditional formats such as Web pages or visual media, and material taken from such sources.
