Course Description

This course offers an introduction to the social, political, and cultural aspects of new media. It examines the social factors that influence the use of new media, as well as the effects of new media on different spheres of social life. Topics include, among others, the core concepts and approaches to new media; the history of new media and current developments; issues related to identity and representation in new media; participatory cultures; civic practices in new media; copyright and Internet law; and surveillance and governance in new media

Objectives of the Course

By the end of this course, students should be able to:

- 1. Identify and discuss the core concepts associated to the origins, history, and theoretical approaches to new media.
- 2. Develop a critical perspective concerning new media's history and the role of new media in society, economics, politics, and culture.
- 3. Analyze the course material and interrogate their new media practices and participation in digital cultures within the context of everyday lives through written assignments as well as lab activities.
- 4. Continue working on developing verbal and written analytic skills needed for undergraduate study

Plagiarism

Wording taken directly from a source must be enclosed within quotation marks (or, for long quotations, presented in the format prescribed by the documentation style you are using). Paraphrased information must not follow the original wording and sentence structure with only slight word substitutions here and there.
