Course Description

This course examines the nature, origins and social implications of new media with a focus on the Internet. Evolving forms of interpersonal, group and public communication based on the Internet will be assessed in terms of the role they play in identity formation, cultural integration, learning, political participation, commerce and work. This course will focus primarily on the effects of what has been termed convergence culture, and its effects on communication and community in online environments, including discussion forums and communities, blogs, and social networking sites. Discussion will focus on issues such as social justice and copyright.

Objectives of the Course

This course aims to equip students with fundamental knowledge and skills to assess communication on the Internet and to participate in online communication effectively. Students will learn to:

- Think critically and read critically a variety of online documents
- Communicate effectively both through oral presentations and written documents
- Understand the conventions and strategies for online communication
- Produce written documents that are focused, coherent, and readable

Internet and electronic communication device information

Students may use laptops to take notes and facilitate class discussion, but not to do any personal work, such as Facebook or checking email, and may not use cell phones to make or receive calls.
