## **Course Description**

This course looks at American films made since 1977 which contributed to the greater visibility and mainstream success of films categorized as "independent." It will include films by Sayles, Jarmusch, Lee, Haynes, Linklater and Holofcener.

## **Objectives of the Course**

To define the category of American independent cinema

To identify and analyze key films and filmmakers in this category

To develop written skills in film analysis

# Take Home Exam: Due December 15: 35%

A take-home exam with either one or two questions will be distributed and discussed at the last lecture, **December 8**. The exam will encompass material from the entire course. Students will be expected to undertake independent research on their own and write a sound, scholarly response in essay format. Your final submission should be between 1500 – 1800 words.

The take-home exam is due by **Wednesday**, **December 15 at 12 PM**, for grading with comments. After that date, exams will be graded with no comments. **No exams will be accepted after December 21.** 

Note: Please hand in your essays directly to your instructor if possible. If it is not possible

to do so, a daytime drop box is available in SS320; a date stamp is provided for your use. A night drop box is also available for after-hours submission. Assignments will be removed the following morning, stamped with the previous day's date, and placed in the instructor's mailbox.

Where a grade on a particular assignment is expressed as a letter grade, it will normally be converted to a number using the midpoint of the scale. That is, A- would be converted to 87.5 for calculation purposes. F will be converted to zero.

### **Plagiarism**

Using any source whatsoever without clearly documenting it is a serious academic offense. Consequences include failure on the assignment, failure in the course and possibly suspension or expulsion from the university.

You must document not only direct quotations but also paraphrases and ideas where they appear in your text. A reference list at the end is insufficient by itself. Readers must be able to tell exactly where your words and ideas end and other people's words and ideas begin. This includes assignments submitted in non-traditional formats such as Web pages or visual media, and material taken from such sources.
