Course Description

John Carpenter is a director of the New Hollywood generation who has maintained a distinctive style through a decades long career. He has specialized in horror, science fiction and action films, with the Western as a constant subtext running through his films. This course will screen many of his films and examine key literature about Carpenter, genre, the Hollywood system and authorship.

Objectives of the Course

The student will learn issues of cinematic authorship, especially in Hollywood, through examining the career of John Carpenter.

Textbooks and Readings

The Cinema of John Carpenter: The Technique of Terror (eds. Conrich and Woods). London: Wallflower, 2005.

Assignments and Evaluation

25% **Assignment One:** Choose **one** of the following options:

Option 1: Timothy Corrigan writes about how in post-classical Hollywood, auteurship has come to resemble stardom and celebrity as an auteur's persona circulates in forms that render their films secondary. Analyze one text related to John Carpenter other than one of his films or television programs to identify how his authorial star persona manifests. Examples might include a commentary track for one of his or for someone else's films, a prominent interview, a public appearance, his music or his connections with the video game or comic book industries, etc.

Option 2: Carpenter's authorial persona includes his tendency to revise his past works. Write about either how *Assault on Precinct 13* revises Howard Hawks's *Rio Bravo* (1959), *Halloween* revises *Psycho* (1960) or *Someone's Watching Me* revises *Rear Window* (1954). Be sure to explore Carpenter's use of film form (including formal elements such as mise-en-scene, cinematography, editing, sound, etc.) and not just plot elements, characterization, etc.

Option 3: Robin Wood argues that Carpenter is a reactionary filmmaker. Explain why and, with reference to at least three of his films, argue for or against this position.

You are required to draw on (and properly cite and source) at least two articles we have read in this course to strengthen and contextualize your argument. Assignment length: 4/5 full pages. Read the style guide provided on D2L and follow it fully. Marks may be deducted for students who fail to comply.

35% **Assignment Two**

A list of suggested essay topics will be submitted mid-course.

You are required to draw on (and properly cite and source) at least three articles we have read in this course to strengthen and contextualize your argument. Assignment length: 6/7 full pages. Read the style guide provided on D2L and follow it fully. Marks may be deducted for students who fail to comply.

Due April 12.

30% **In-Class Presentation**

Every student is responsible for **one** in-class presentation on an essay we read during the course. Each will be of roughly 20-25 minutes, and take the following form:

First, the student will sum up the article's main points and central claims. This summary will be roughly half of the presentation.

Second, the student will discuss the article's strength and limitations, while drawing some connections between the article and (where relevant) the film screened that week or the course material more broadly.

Finally, the student should provide a few provocative and relevant questions for his or her fellow students and be prepared to lead discussion for a time.

Students will be graded on their understanding of the material, the rigour of their insights and their skill in presentation.

These will generally be held on the **Tuesday** meetings, and a sign-in sheet will be distributed early in the course.

10% Participation Grade

Students are expected to both attend both lectures and labs and participate in classroom discussion. Marks will be assigned determined by the quality and volume of participation. A student who attends regularly but does not participate in classroom discussion can expect no more than 5/10.

Plagiarism

Using any source whatsoever without clearly documenting it is a serious academic offense. Consequences include failure on the assignment, failure in the course and possibly suspension or expulsion from the university.

You must document not only direct quotations but also paraphrases and ideas where they appear in your text. A reference list at the end is insufficient by itself. In-text citations must be provided, and readers must be able to tell exactly where your words and ideas end and other people's words and ideas begin. Wording taken directly from a source must be enclosed within quotation marks (or, for long quotations, presented in the format prescribed by the documentation style you are using). Paraphrased information must not follow the original wording and sentence structure with only slight word substitutions here and there. These requirements apply to all assignments and sources, including those in non-traditional formats such as Web pages or visual media.
