Additional Information

This is largely a workshop class and will require you to present your creative writing to the class for the purpose of analysis and critique on a regular basis. Students are expected to fully participate in all workshops and classes, and to contribute to a supportive and respectful atmosphere.

Responsibility for attending and fulfilling the requirements for lectures, readings and assignments resides with the student. The professor will not give out lecture notes, repeat information, nor provide replacement copies of material that was provided during regular class hours. Use of recording technologies in class is prohibited.

Students are expected to check Blackboard before the class for any last minute changes or cancellations.

Course Description

This course introduces students to the form of the screenplay and its various components, from the study of structure to the development of character, dialogue and sample scenes. It will also address the area of "pitching" in the film development process.

This course will be conducted through writing workshops and writing assignments, along with a combination of screenings, lectures and discussions. Students will be expected to read their own work aloud and to participate in critiquing the work of other students.

Objectives of the Course

Learn to develop, present (pitch), and write (in a professional industry format) a screenplay

Learn to analyze and critique the work of your peers Learn to analyze films in relation to their screenplays

Assignments and Evaluation

Participation (on-going)

During workshop sessions, students will be required to read their own work aloud and to respond to the work of other students with helpful critique. As well, participation in discussions during lectures is an important element of the course. The participation grade will be based on the quality of your contributions and your willingness to engage with others in a respectful manner.

These assignments will be discussed more fully in class. Marks will be given on the basis of effort, originality and technical elements such as accepted screenplay format.

The package will include: Synopsis, Treatment, Character Descriptions and Sample Scenes.

Evaluation will be based on creative and technical elements, including format, clarity of communication, language skills, strength of structure, creativity and degree of originality.

All submitted work must be properly formatted, proofed and stapled. Marks will be deducted for poor presentation, spelling and grammatical errors. Don't rely solely on the spell check program.

It is the student's responsibility to keep a copy of each submitted assignment for the duration of the semester.

You must document not only direct quotations but also paraphrases and ideas where they appear in your text. A reference list at the end is insufficient by itself. Readers must be able to tell exactly where your words and ideas end and other people's words and ideas begin. This includes assignments submitted in non-traditional formats such as Web pages or visual media, and material taken from such sources.
